#### What is the difference between an IEP and 504?

The Special Services department currently serves 1,351 students with an IEP and 145 students with a 504 plan. So what does that mean? Both an IEP and a 504 plan provide important services and protection to students with exceptionalities. Both have federal oversight to ensure that schools are doing what is necessary to provide eligible students access to their education. 
